ALL THINGS ART...

Gustav Klimt - Tree of Life

KS3 students studied the artist Gustav Klimt and his distinctive style and imagery. Looking closely at the way he uses patterns and extraordinary creative energy in his Art Nouveau style of painting.

The boys copied his expressive style to create their own 'Tree of Life' paintings using his impressive swirling patterns found in this piece, which are unique in Klimt's artwork.















'Dotty Circles' lesson with KS2 Olive class. The boys explored colour, layering, mark making, and shape by applying different layers of colour using felt pens, water, bingo dabbers, and the ends of carboard tubes dipped in poster paint.

Andy Warhol - Pop Art

Andy Warhol, a pioneer of the Pop Art movement, was known for his bold, repetitive images and vibrant use of colour. By incorporating Warhol's signature style, like in his Pineapple print. KS2 students used apples dipped into printing ink onto brightly coloured papers. This can help children see how everyday objects-like apples-can be transformed into dynamic works of art.















HALESWORTH IN BLOOM

This term, some students from Olive class have taken part in Halesworth in Bloom. Each Tuesday we have been out to different areas in Halesworth to help to maintain the plants and public gardens in the area. We enjoyed collecting up the fallen leaves to lay on the path to make it less slippery for people who were using the park. We also weeded and planted wild plant seeds in the road leading up to the station, which we are really looking forward to seeing bloom very soon.







3D DESIGN...



It has been an inspiring and productive term in the 3D Design workshop, with students showcasing their creativity and producing some quality work.

In Lower KS3, pupils have been exploring the world of superhero figures, researching various designs, and creating their own unique models. Using a hand-made metal armature and Mod Roc clay, pupils carefully crafted their designs and painted and varnished the finished article. The next step, will involve students designing bespoke commercial packaging, including vacuum-formed blister packaging, to present their models.


Upper KS3 students have focused on honing their isometric drawing skills alongside improving there woodworking techniques. They have developed proficiency in measuring and marking with precision and have practised wood finishing techniques. As part of their design stage, pupils researched existing toolbox designs before creating their own creative ideas, which they then brought to life through hands-on construction.

In KS4, as part of their 3D Design GCSE, students have delved into the work of renowned designers and artists, including Zaha Hadid, Rachel Whiteread, and Jean Nouvel. Drawing inspiration from their styles, students designed models, experimented with techniques used by these creatives and are now preparing to create finished animal habitats based on their research and findings.

It's been an exciting term full of exploration, skill development, and creativity. I`m looking forward to seeing how these projects continue to evolve next term.

ORWELL COUNTRY PARK

Their chemigrams involved placing chemicals onto photopaper in interesting ways and developing them to create different patterns, shapes and textures. The photograms involved using the enlargers in the darkroom to expose light onto different objects on photopaper to create interesting contrasting images. The boys had a great time experimenting and challenging their artistic abilities to create some really lovely images!













This term we have continued to work towards improving our knowledge and understanding of climate action and what we can do to make a difference at home, at school and in the world at large.

2025 is a year where climate education becomes a real focus for schools in the UK. All schools will have a climate action plan and look to become carbon neutral and increase biodiversity and build a connection with

Recycling is still going well. All food waste continues to be composted, bread wrappings, biscuit wrappings, batteries and toner cartridges are sent away to be recycled. We have also started recycling pens at school too.

At school we have taken part in World Wildlife Day where we completed activities about wildlife and what can be done to support them and increase their numbers for future generations.

We learnt about recycling on Global Recycling Day and are currently taking part in the Great British School Clean where we have pledged to pick up 10 bags of rubbish.

Boys have taken part in the Big Schools Birdwatch and many are now keen bird watchers going out and about in the local area. We continue to see increasing numbers of birds on the site, including a flock of Redwing and recently a Song Thrush has been spotted.

In February we welcomed local farmers to the school for our farming day. James and Laura Porter from Porters Farm brought in their John Deere tractor so that boys could learn all about farming and best of all sit inside. Boys also enjoyed handling crops that they brought in to show, such as wheat, barley and oil seed rape. Boys were amazed to hear that the tractor would cost £200,000 new and the back tyres alone would cost £10,000 to replace. They were also interested to find out that driving the tractor was like playing a computer game using a joystick to control the tractor. Finally Discussion were had around where our food comes from and what needs to be done to produce this.















VISIT TO COLCHESTER ZOO

Elm class visited Colchester zoo as part of our Science learning around endangered animals. We really enjoyed getting up close to all of the animals, exploring their habitats and diets, all boys asked lots of amazing questions. We were lucky enough to see so many animals and our highlights of the zoo included feeding the lorikeet birds boys and staff faced some new fears around holding birds on our arms, even our heads!

We then got to observe tigers trying to escape their enclosure, elephants being fed, and the sea lion tunnel with swimming sealions above us and finding out lots of facts about how the zoo helps animals that are endangered.

VISIT TO LONDON





On Thursday 27th February, Holly Class made the journey to London, in order to bring their knowledge of the history of the city, which they've been studying in their humanities lessons, to life.

To top off our journey through the capital, we walked through St James' Park to Buckingham Palace. We took the tube back to Fenchurch Street Station, hopped on the train back to Basildon, and then began our drive back homewards. The boys finally enjoyed a well-deserved dinner from McDonalds after walking a hefty 17,000 steps and climbing 28 flights of stairs!
