When a hurting boy finds his safe place


I will miss all the laughs and the madness





# MEDIA








## WORK EXPERIENCE



# WIMBLEDON





# 3D DESIGN




As we come to the end of a busy summer term, we can look back and see how pupils in KS3 have been developing their making skills through a range of creative projects. Many of the boys have built flapping bird mobiles, ball bearing travel games, wooden toolboxes and simple automata's, looking at how cam mechanisms work and gaining confidence with tools and materials. Alongside this, they've designed their own superhero models and created packaging to hold and present their final products. It's been a productive term with a sound mix of practical learning and design thinking.

In KS4, our GCSE pupils have been learning about renowned designers such as Frank Gehry, Zaha Hadid and the Memphis Group, leading onto them trying out ideas in similar design styles. This led onto a design-and-make stage of the project focusing on creating bird/ bee habitats, where pupils used their research and experiment outcomes to inform their ideas. There's been steady progress and a clear improvement in independence, with some thoughtful and well-made results to end the term.




### Max Barclay Visits Bramfield House

On 7th July, students at Bramfield House enjoyed a fascinating visit from Max Barclay, Senior Curator at the Natural History Museum. Max spoke about his recent expedition to the Amazon rainforest in Bolivia, where he collected rare beetles in one of the world's most biodiverse regions.

He shared exciting stories about camping in the jungle, searching for insects, and preparing specimens for the museum. Max also brought a selection of beetles from the museum's collection, giving students a chance to see real, exotic insects up close.

His talk inspired curiosity and showed how important insects are to science and the environment. A big thank you to Max for sharing his passion and knowledge with us!





# ECO NEWS



This term has seen us continue with our journey towards sustainability. We have continued to compost all of our food waste and recycle where we can. Our wildflower meadow is beginning to flourish with more wildflowers. The school site is brimming with bees and butterflies attracted to the flowers on site including a magnificent buddleia known as a butterfly bush. The swift boxes haven't been used yet but we have had up to 15 swifts screaming around the school. We have had blue tits hatch several broods around the site making use of the rapidly growing hedges we have planted to find caterpillars to feed their young.

As a school we have celebrated World Environment Day, World Ocean Day for Schools and we have taken part in the Great Big Green Week where we looked at reducing our plastic use and increasing our recycling. We are also looking at ways to reduce our energy and water consumption. This is something we are going to work on more in the next school year. During this term we have started a collaboration with a local charity Natural Habitat and have begun to take part in the second year of their "Weaving Farms, Land, People and Planet project. 'Weaving Farms, Land, People & Planet' project, was funded by DEFRA's Farming in Protected Landscapes programme, connecting farms, schools, and refugee organisations to foster environmental learning. Through expert-led sessions, it celebrated sustainable land practices and creates resources for communities to engage with nature. Pine class visited Brick Kiln Farm in Westleton on Tuesday 17th June. Here they took part in activities such as learning about ponds on farms, how they were formed by digging out clay for building materials and what can affect the life in them such as pollution. Boys were able to make their own animations in a woodland, whilst learning about the different trees and how increasing numbers of deer are affecting them. Clay imprints were taken of the leaves that were found and Joe discovered his inner potter and enjoyed working with clay. We also spent time exploring the biodiversity around the farm especially the different plants. The boys learnt how to make boats out of reeds, which they really enjoyed although not as much as Mia!! Exploring the compost bins led to the discovery of grass snakes which had made their homes in them and laid eggs there too. This really fascinated the boys. We are looking forward to our next visit which will be Broad Oak Farm across the road, on 18th September.



# VE DAY



The boys and staff of Bramfield House acknowledged and celebrated the significance of the eightieth anniversary of VE Day this term. VE Day started with a 1940s breakfast (without the rationing!) and was accompanied by footage of VE Day on our big screen and archive recording of speeches from the time, eyewitness accounts and music to put us, "in the mood." The morning continued with assemblies that outlined the courage and sacrifice made by people of many nations and enabled us to reflect on the scale of loss caused by this conflict. We were honoured to be joined by Derek Draper (Chairman of the Halesworth British Royal Legion) and Glen Revell (Treasurer of the Halesworth British Legion), who were both members of His Majesties Armed Forces, who joined classes and answered questions throughout the morning, whilst our timetable reflected the significance of the occasion and enabled our boys to learn more about VE Day and World War II, both in the classroom and out. The national two minutes silence was impeccably observed at 12:00pm and of particular poignance was the laying of a wreath at the Bramfield St Andrews War Memorial by one of young army cadets, accompanied by his classmates. The day was rounded off by a sumptuous lunch and visits to Flixton Air Museum.

# ★ THRIVE ★



This academic term we have introduced Thrive across the whole school. The thrive approach is a evidence based structured approach to help children develop the social and emotional skills needed to thrive in all areas of life. Thrive helps adults understand that behaviour, both positive and challenging, is often a way children communicate their needs and feelings.

Thrive emphasizes the importance of positive relationships in a child's development. For all adults, this means understanding how your interactions with the child can foster their emotional well-being.

We have profiled all the boys at Bramfield and used this information to plan strategies and activities that will support the boys to make informed social and emotional decisions. These strategies enable the boys to feel good about themselves and know that they matter.

Thrive sessions increase their sense of security and trust, increase their emotional well-being, improve their capacity to be creative and curious and increase their self-esteem and confidence to learn. The boys have begun to learn to recognise and regulate their feelings and to think before behaving in a certain way.

For a third of our classes the boys have improved their social and emotional skills by 4 years in just 3 months which has had a huge positive impact in their daily lives at school.

Next academic year we have an ambassador member of staff in each class who will ensure that the thrive approach continues to be embedded across the school.



## PARISH COUNCIL VISIT



As Chair of the local Parish Council, I have now visited the school on two separate occasions, once during the day and once after school hours. As a retired teacher I have been keen to see how the complex needs of the students are dealt with. On both occasions I have been seriously impressed by what I have seen. The physical environment of Bramfield House could not be better for the boys who attend this school; the spacious setting in a tranquil rural setting is ideal. Space is set aside for sporting activities such as swimming, indoor activities and field sports whilst the physical environment is cared for through horticultural and agricultural activities. The classrooms are spacious but homely and the contented students seem to thrive in this caring situation. The staff are dedicated to students' education and well-being, as reflected in the students' positive feedback during my visits. The school has shown itself to be keen to involve itself in the wider community and I look forward with the rest of the Parish Council and the village of Bramfield to do so.


# THE MASKED SINGER

## FOOD AND FARMING DAY



On Wednesday 18th June we visited Hollow Trees Farm for the Food and Farming Day organised by the Suffolk Agricultural Association. The day is set up to highlight the large range of careers available in the farming and food industries and we were part of 500 students there on the day. Linda our guide met us and led us on our tour around various stations manned by representatives of different companies and careers. Our first station was a company that deals with irrigation and water use. Water use is becoming increasingly important as use is beginning to catch up with the amount of fresh water there is. Here they were using satellite systems which only applied water where it was needed. We then went to learn about sheep and watched shepherdess Tilly shear a sheep in about a minute which meant the boys teased me as I took considerably longer to shear Shaun! We moved on to meet a chef who was making amazing recipes with fresh ingredients from the garden including what to do with a surplus of veg. We got to taste the recipes which were delicious including rose jam. Next, we visited an agronomist who is like a doctor for crops looking at ways to make crops grow better and bigger and to treat them if they become ill. We then stopped for a delicious lunch of sausage roll made on the farm using meat from the pigs, local crisps, brownie and fresh strawberries. After lunch we went and saw the machinery which pleased Tobias! We learnt about the different jobs from selling the machinery, fixing the machinery and selling the parts. The price of the combine was a bit eye-watering at around £500,000 -£750,000. The importance of soil was next on the agenda as crops for humans and animals won't grow without good soil. All in all an enjoyable day learning about careers they could aim for in the future. The organisers praised the boys for their engagement during the day.




